



PRISMA, have been immensely rewarding, but in the coming year I have personal commitments that will take me away from Powell River for considerable periods, including the dates of PRISMA itself, making it unrealistic for me to effectively fulfil the role of President. However, my regret in stepping away from the position (though not from the PRISMA Board) is tempered by the knowledge that I am handing over to Mike Robinson, who I know will lead PRISMA to even greater success.

It has been a privilege to be identified with PRISMA, and to experience

directly the warmth of feeling and sense of ownership that our community has towards the festival. When I reflect on the pleasure that it has brought since its inception, this community engagement stands out as one of the causes. PRISMA events give us far more than outstanding music; they also give us a chance to celebrate in a way that unites rather than divides us.

A second cause of delight is the impact that PRISMA has on the lives and careers of the young musicians who come to Powell River every year to learn and to perform. Their dedication, talent and energy communicates and connects with the enthusiasm and appreciation of the

audience to generate a synergy that is unique in my concert-going experience.

Some highlights from my PRISMA memories:

- The occasion when the audience gave Edwin Sungpil Kim a standing ovation at the mention of his name, even though he was not present at the time;
- Every single performance of the Concerto Competition finalists;
- The reaction of the audience at the end of each concert, clearly reluctant to go home;
- The view from the stage during PRISMA on the Beach, showing the Powell River community in its diversity, and in the glorious setting of Willingdon Beach, both of which remind me of my good fortune in living here.

Good luck for PRISMA 2019 – I look forward to being fully involved again for PRISMA 2020!

ur Gala Opening Concert offered the unusual combination of three movements of Bach's Violin Sonata No.1, played alternately by Martin Chalifour and Richard Roberts, alternating with four movements of Mozart's "Gran Partita" Serenade for winds. It was also the first opportunity to hear new guest artist Máté Szűcs, Principal Viola of the Berliner Philharmoniker, who performed Weber's Andante e Rondo Ungarese with the PRISMA Festival Orchestra.

Each symphony concert had a theme. The first concert, "A Journey to Italy" included Máté Szűcs in a luminous performance of Berlioz' Harold in Italy. The final concert, "Diaghilev and the Ballets Russes" was performed on the penultimate evening

and repeated the next day as the Saturday matinée "Symphony Cruise." PRISMA's largest ever orchestra (87 strong) tackled Stravinsky's monumental Le Sacre du Printemps (The Rite of Spring) to a standing ovation.

Twelve students participated in the semifinals of the Concerto Competition with the incomparable accompaniment of pianist Edwin Sungpil Kim. Audiences delighted in hearing trumpet, horn, cello, clarinet, harp, violin, flute, bassoon, bass and viola, with Samuel Choi (viola) and Taylor Fleshman (harp) moving on to the final round.


Hats off to Samuel Choi, who woke up so ill the day before the finals that he could not get out of bed. In the end, however, he did make it to the competition and we will never forget his courageous performance of the first movement of Bartok's Viola Concerto. Taylor Fleshman, playing the final movement of Ginastera's Harp Concerto, received the judges' nod and the first prize of a week in Moscow to rehearse and perform with Maestro

Arnold's Moscow Symphony Orchestra.

The Chamber Music Concert, as always, offered Powell River the talents of our guest artists. Dennis Kim (violin), with a section of string students, gave us the tango-inspired Last Round by Osvaldo Golijov. Oliver de Clercq, Marcus Goddard and Gordon Cherry performed the playful yet sophisticated Poulenc Sonata for Horn, Trumpet and Trombone, and guest artists and students provided continuity with the Gala Opening Concert in their performance of the remaining movements of the Mozart "Gran Partita" Wind Serenade.

Flute and harp have regularly been featured in PRISMA's chamber music concerts and this year Janet Arms (flute) and Cheryl Losey Feder (harp) were joined by Michael Gieler (viola) in Arnold Bax's appropriately named Elegiac Trio. The concert concluded with Dvořák's Piano Quintet No. 2, considered one of the three supreme achievements (along with those of Schumann and Brahms) of the form. We were privileged to have it performed by Richard Roberts, Dennis Kim, Michael Gieler, Brian Yoon (cello) and Edwin Sungpil Kim.

Finally, let us not forget PRISMA on the Beach. Blessed with fine weather, Powell River's favourite outdoor concert was appreciatively received by young and old, particularly when Maestro Arnold was "in trouble" as he did not have a magic wand to conduct the Harry Potter Suite. All was not lost, however, as a wizard with the necessary wand was located to take over the conductor's duties.

















Daily Masterclasses

20 masterclasses, covering all instruments of the orchestra, were open to the public during PRISMA 2018. Here is how one of our patrons described them:

he whole experience of the festival is unique. I am a regular attender of the violin and viola masterclasses. Those four afternoon sessions are my favourite! This year I had an enjoyable brief talk with Michael Gieler, sectional viola leader of the Royal Concergebouw in Amersterdam. He said he found PRISMA completely refreshing: a low-key situation for refining symphonic music, in which there is a great bonding between students and instructors, combined with the welcoming attitude of the Powell River citizens.

The masterclasses bring me back to a magical time in my life, when I was in youth orchestras. To see how a piece is worked on and perfected before your eyes is rewarding. It's as if the masterclass is the "engine room" of the orchestra: the bugs are worked out, and playing is improved. I admire the courage of the young performers who have come from various continents, just to participate in such an experience. The audience is

usually seniors, and they show an avid interest in the proceedings. The players know that the audience is supporting them, even though they are newcomers. This year I was particularly moved by a young polish female violinist who played the Mozart No. 5 concerto.

PRISMA and the masterclasses contribute to Powell River's cultural life, by injecting a whole outside world of musical knowledge and expertise into a small, localized community. It's like an injection or infusion of immense energy. We all feel it, and love it.

PRISMA should continue to enable the public to have access to behind-the-scenes programming, because this is the real side of musicmaking. It is not the hype, the advertising and the glossy programs that create music, but rather the hard work of teacher and student, who come together in a partnership, and who produce results through collaboration. Concerts are themselves occasions of grand symphonic majesty, but seeing how a concert or piece is put together adds to our overall understanding of the music. Performance is not easy, and it's good for us "average folk" who are not professional musicians, to see the rough and tumble side of things. We appreciate a refined concert more, when we realize how much work has gone into ironing out the rough bits."

PRISMA for Kids

In 2018, PRISMA once again offered special access to concerts and events for youth under the age of 18. This included discounted concert tickets and free access to all masterclasses. In partnership with School District No. 47, the 2018 PRISMA for Kids programme featured an instructed rehearsal of the Harry Potter Symphonic Suite. Over 400 elementary students arrived at the Evergreen Theatre mid-morning on June 12 to see and hear the PRISMA Festival Orchestra rehearse a medley of themes from the popular film, Harry Potter and the Sorcerer's Stone. Paul Cummings (PRISMA Artistic Support) provided an introduction to the orchestra and the music while, in addition to conducting the orchestra, Maestro Arthur Arnold entertained students with some dramatic improvisation. All teachers were provided with follow-up resource materials to keep the musical minds active long after the final downbeat.

he direct, indirect and induced economic benefits of PRISMA on the economy of Powell River are significant. The accepted multiplier for PRISMA-like music festivals worldwide is generally held to be 2:1. That means a dollar spent on delivering PRISMA programs generates two dollars' worth of benefit in the regional economy. For example, carloads of symphony aficionados from Courtenay arrive via BC Ferries for the PRISMA Festival, book hotel rooms, dine in

local restaurants, embark on boat or fishing tours and enjoy the many services Powell River has to offer in June. For Powell River and the regional district, this means an indirect benefit of over \$1 million. Added to this are induced benefits arising from an increased tourist profile and resulting expenditures. These are harder to quantify, but undoubtedly add to the multiplier. If we assume a conservative estimate of a 2.4 multiplier for the total benefits, the figure rises to over \$1.3 million. Possibly even more significant than the financial benefits, however, is the effect that PRISMA has on the life of the community. None would question that PRISMA has rapidly become an integral part of the calendar of the region and is one of the key factors that help shape our civic and cultural identity.

Symphony Cruise

n June 23, PRISMA welcomed 350 concertgoers who travelled from Vancouver Island to attend our final concert of 2018 - a matinée performance of Stravinsky's Rite of Spring. Our annual Symphony Cruise has become a popular PRISMA tradition, thanks to the support of founding sponsor Balfe/Somers Wealth Management of RBC Dominion Securities. With offices in Courtenay and Powell River, Brian Balfe and Don Somers continue to be generous ambassadors for this popular day trip, which extends PRISMA's reach across the water and well into the Comox Valley. The 2018 instalment of the Symphony Cruise boasted our largest out-of-town audience to date.

Feedback from passengers travelling on board BC Ferries' Salish Orca to attend the event was overwhelmingly positive, and many patrons chose to stay in Powell River for an extra night or two, exploring the area in its peak season and patronizing local hotels, restaurants and businesses. The event is truly a win-win for PRISMA, for BC Ferries, for Balfe/Somers Wealth Management, and for the community of Powell River – demonstrating the power of music to unite us physically, culturally and economically.











PRISMA on the Beach

n June 16, for the sixth year in a row, PRISMA presented a free, family-friendly musical extravaganza at Willingdon Beach. Our international guest artists and PRISMA Festival Orchestra performed overlooking the Strait of Georgia as thousands of spectators enjoyed the music, food and art on display. The weather cooperated and the musicians marvelled repeatedly at the beautiful setting for this concert.

After soliciting feedback from the public in 2017, we unveiled several programming changes at the 2018 event. The biggest involved speeches and pre-show entertainment, which were eliminated in favour of a longer program. Our all-ages audience was eager to welcome PRISMA in all its musical glory, receiving a smorgasbord of orchestral gems such as the Harry Potter Suite and works by Elgar and Tchaikovsky.

Our 2018 event also featured significant improvements in responsible waste management, with the Let's Talk Trash team and qathet Regional District's Mobile Dishwashing Trailer both on site.



We are happy to report that three large bags of refundable drink containers, one large bag of recyclable containers and two large bags of compost were kept out of Powell River's garbage stream!















Spring Concerts

It has become an annual tradition for PRISMA to launch its musical season in April with a spring concert to whet the public's musical appetite. For the 2018 installment we were joined by award-winning pianist Edwin Sungpil Kim, who performed a series of concerts in Vancouver, Courtenay and Powell River with Maestro Arthur Arnold joining him on cello. Just a few months earlier, the Baltimore-based musician had claimed the grand prize at the 3rd Australian International Chopin Piano Competition.

International Collaborations


Maestro Arthur Arnold continues to bring new opportunities to PRISMA's students through his work with the Moscow Symphony Orchestra (MSO).

In March, our 2017 Concerto Competition winner Noemi Sallai (Hungary) travelled to Russia to appear with the MSO, followed soon after by our seven Conducting Masterclass students from Argentina, Israel, Japan, South Korea, and the United States.

Financial Statements

In 2018, PRISMA applied for, and was the recipient of, a BC Arts Council Arts Operating Grant for \$23,050 annually for the next three years. We also renewed our agreement with the City of Powell River for another three-year term, and signed a renewal contract with BC Ferries to continue as Title Sponsor of PRISMA. Building guaranteed multi-year funding into the budget is vital for planning and executing a successful festival.

For the 2017-18 fiscal year PRISMA is reporting a deficit of \$12,602, or, 2% of our annual budget. In prior years, PRISMA built up financial reserves in anticipation of growing the human resource department. This year, to meet the needs of the growing festival, and to keep it energized, we undertook an ambitious human resource program, hiring qualified replacements for departing personnel, and filling some volunteer positions with paid staff. As a result, we have a dynamic, professional team of employees and contractors, supplemented by an excellent and hard-working volunteer base.

hanks to the generosity of its members, PRISMA is able to attract premier students and outstanding guest artists from around the world, while keeping concerts affordable and accessible to our community.

At the close of 2018 festival, PRISMA membership stood at 364 individuals; a 22% increase over 2017 final numbers of 298, and a 119% increase from the 2016 number of 166. In 2018 we also extended a membership offer to our students for the year of their attendance at PRISMA, adding 87 new student members to the ranks before the end of our 2018 season of activities.



PRISMA aims to become one of the world's premier symphony festivals and academies by attracting music students of the highest merit. Thanks to the generosity of more than 24 donors and foundations in 2018, our Musical Merit Scholarship Fund (MMSF) awarded \$65,820 in full and partial scholarships to 63 deserving students who could not otherwise afford the cost of tuition. This is up 34 per cent from 2017's figure of \$49,095.

Volunteers, like members, are the lifeblood of PRISMA. Without their support it would be impossible to stage such a massive international program in Powell River. They are truly appreciated and to be commended for the generous donation of their time and resources.
